#### THE HEART OF THE QUAKER WAY

#### Ben Pink Dandelion

The Quaker way is often portrayed as an individual one or one hard to define. However, there is a clear and contained sense of what it is to be a Quaker and how to be Quaker. This course explores what can be thought of as the heart of the Quaker way.

Thus, the day will cover the essentials aspects of the Quaker way of faith, its core understandings, and its message for the future: direct encounter with the divine; a distinctive form of worship; the centrality of discernment; and our witness in the world. #### THE HISTORY OF THE QUAKER WAY

#### Ben Pink Dandelion

The Quaker way has undergone many changes since the start of the movement in the 1650s. This day will offer a clear and accessible outline of the key changes in attitude and emphasis that have brought us to our current expression of the Quaker faith.

Thus, the day will run through the different periods of Quaker theology, starting with an in-depth exploration of the first Friends. How Quakers have related to wider society, and what Friends sense their purpose is, has changed in each period and is key to how the movement has changed in the way it sees itself and presents itself.

Andrew Jack has been a Quaker for over a decade. He studied philosophy at London and Oxford universities, and has taught philosophy in London, Oxford and Hong Kong. As a research student at Woodbrooke, he is working on Philosophy and Quakerism.

Ann Bettys is an experienced teacher and facilitator who has had a lifelong passion for dance. She has danced many forms of movement from contemporary to jazz, salsa, clog and even Morris dance. Her interests currently lie with finding ways to allow the expression of feelings about the world through dance and movement. Music and rhythm are an important part of the dance experience. Ann has been collaborating with Robin Bowles on dance and music for many years.

Annique Seddon set up a counselling service for staff and students in a college where she led the Counselling Welfare and Chaplaincy service. Since retirement she has led courses at Woodbrooke, Swarthmoor Hall and Glenthorne and has been a personal tutor and spiritual accompanier for EFM participants and others. Her own losses led to the grace of becoming a Quaker, where she feels grounded as she shares profound, painful and joyous conversations and silences in friendship.

Barbara has belonged to the facilitator community of the Center for Courage & Renewal since 2012 and has designed and hosted 'circles of trust' retreats in the U.K. and beyond since then. Barbara also works with people who are walking the path of grief and loss. She offers grieftending circles and retreat spaces where participants can gather to speak to and have their grief and loss witnessed.

Benjamin Wood is a visiting researcher at the Centre of Religion and Public Life (University of Leeds). He has previously taught Theology and Religious Studies at Leeds Trinity, the University of Chester, and the University of Manchester. Benjamin is a Supervisor at the University of Birmingham.

Her practice and spiritual life deepened when she discovered teachings about becoming more mindful of the breath and the body and was struck by how some Buddhist practices like Metta (loving Kindness) seem to be so similar to Quaker practices like Holding in the Light.

Charlotte Cooper is the Peace Lead for Quakers in Britain. Her work involves campaigning for peace with and on behalf of Friends, representing Quakers in peace networks and movements, and supporting Friends in their witness for peace.

**Chris Skidmore** is a former clerk of Yearly Meeting who has been part of the 'Being a Quaker Clerk' team since 2017, teaching both at Woodbrooke and on-line.

Daniel Clarke Flynn is a native of San Francisco, citizen of Ireland and resident of Belgium. He is a member of Westminster Meeting, London and is a Quaker Action on Alcohol and Drugs trustee. He mentors and supports the African Great Lakes Consortium of twelve local African created and managed charities in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Burundi. He serves as a volunteer for Médecins Sans Frontières' (MSF) headquarters in Brussels doing translations, editing and English language teaching and workshop leading.

**David Curtis** is currently working on a new translation and commentary on The Gospel of Mary, in between leading friendly study groups, building websites for Hampshire & the Islands meetings, and fixing up his Southampton houseboat.

**Diana Lampen** has taught peace education and yoga for many years.

Diana Luther Powell is an Associate Tutor at Woodbrooke and was a Quaker Prison Chaplain for nine years until retiring at the end of 2022. Qualified as a specialist dance teacher, she worked across the whole range of education from Year One to 80 year-olds! Her most recent work before retirement in 2012 was as a commissioner for adult drug misuse which actually sparked her interest in prison work. Diana lives in South Yorkshire and worships at Wooldale LM which is part of Central Yorkshire Area Meeting.

Gill Greenfield has been a Quaker for most of her life and has held a range of roles in local, area and yearly meeting. She is currently a member of Mid Somerset AM and a member of CNC. Professionally she worked as a nurse in the NHS, latterly in general practice, but took early retirement for family reasons. Gill has also been a puppy raiser for Guide Dogs and, with her retriever Bella, volunteers with Pets as Therapy.

Gill Sewell is a freelance spiritual director and supervisor. She is co-editor of Friends Quarterly magazine and has previously worked for Quakers in Britain in Ministry and Outreach. She worships at Stoke Newington meeting and serves as an Area Meeting Trustee and on Quaker Life Central Committee. She also teaches on the Ignatian Spirituality Course, based at the London Jesuit Centre.

Gill Westcott is a member of West Somerset AM. She trained as an economist, has taught Comparative Economic Systems to undergraduates and trained peer educators about climate change in primary and secondary schools. She has been involved with the Living Witness Project for many years and served on the OPSW Economics and Sustainability Sub-committee where she helped design the Quaker New Economy booklets. Her PhD in Politics looked at how issues of sustainability are dealt with by local government in the South West. She is a member of the Climate Psychology Alliance, a grandmother, and is a Mid Devon District Councillor.

**Gilly Charters** came back to Quakers in the 1980s. She has served with Eldership and Oversight teams and enjoys inreach and outreach.

Gordon Benson has a background in co-operative and voluntary sector development and in that role he helped third sector organisations access the European Structural Funds to finance their work. He has been active in politics, particularly on environmental issues, since he was at college. Gordon has been on a number of Quaker committees including two on environmental and economic issues and it was through working on those that led him to want to promote the Eco Church award scheme

Harriet Heath has provided workshops for parents and grandparents through Philadelphia and New England Yearly Meetings for the last thirty years. She had found that our Quaker beliefs, testimonies, and practices interwoven with findings from developmental research form a basis for parents and grandparents to live with and guide their children. The mother of three and six grandchildren, she shares her approach and experiences with children and grandchildren while encouraging participants to share theirs.

Heather Rowlands is currently serving her local meeting as clerk and is a member of the children's committee. She has worked in primary education and now works for the Birmingham based peace education charity Peacemakers.

**Helen Chambers** has been an elder with oversight and is a trainer with Quaker Life children and young peoples' team.

Hilary Saunders has focussed on policy and legal rights on housing, welfare benefits and child protection in her work for Shelter, Women's Aid and Bristol University. She is a member of Redland Quaker Meeting in Bristol and belongs to the EarthQuakes and the Climate Choir Movement, who both campaign on the climate crisis. For years, as a volunteer, she has supported the campaign to make ecocide an international crime as the best way to protect nature from multinational

companies. She has an M.A. Ord. in English Literature and Fine Art from Edinburgh University and an M.A. in Child Studies from King's College London.

Jacquie Cole has a background in teaching, outreach and community development, and enjoys facilitating reflective and calming experiences for individuals and communities. Her approach has been influenced, informed and enriched by her long-standing mindfulness practice and her more recent Quaker journey. Jacquie is an active Attender at Beverley local meeting and from 2022-2024, worked as a part of the programme co-ordinator team at Woodbrooke.

Jenny Tipping is a candidate to be a Certified Trainer with CNVC. She is a Quaker, and through NVC seeks to live out the peace testimony in her personal and working life.

John Lampen is a trainer in creative conflict handling and author of 'Mending Hurts'. John's books also include The Peace Kit (for children), Answering the Violence: Encounters with Perpetrators and Love Growing in Us: Questioning the Quaker Peace Testimony.

Jonathan Carmichael has worked on improving care in the NHS and voluntary organisations, developing services that cross traditional boundaries between

community nurses, GPs, social care and hospital care. He likes working with a range of people to create new options to solve problems. Jonathan worked for Britain Yearly Meeting on the Simpler Meetings project, finding and sharing ways that Quaker meetings can be easier to run. He worships with Watford Meeting in Hertfordshire, loves singing in choirs, and walking in the woods.

Jonathan Doering became convinced whilst attending Muswell Hill LM twenty years ago and has held various Quaker roles since then. Working in education and community development, he has supported a range of projects to positively influence racial justice and integration. His writing has appeared in various publications, including: The Friend, Friends Journal, Quaker Voices, The Green Parent, and The Guardian. A seasoned educator, he has been in the delivery of many mainstream and Quaker events, both face-to-face and online

Leon Dundas was born in Guyana (ancestral lands of Amerindian tribes), studied in the lands of the Tainos (in the Caribbean) and first nation peoples in America. He is of mixed African, Indian and European heritage. In 2005, he left roles as Ordained Elder in the Church of the Nazarene, Lecturer, Director of Prison Inspections and Mediator/Restorative Justice (RJ) Consultant in Jamaica to lead

a church initiative in London. In 2020, he co-authored Colorizing Restorative Justice and currently serves as a Managing Chaplain and Methodist Minister.

Lia den Daas has been attending the Jesus Lane meeting in Cambridge since 2023. Although she is relatively new to Quakers, it has felt like coming home. She has been involved in a pioneering Faithfulness Group in Britain and is excited to explore how this supportive and communal practice can be meaningful for others.

Linda Murgatroyd uses arts and crafts activities to help ground spirit-led discernment and witness both personally and running workshops. Following the 2010 publication of her essay The Future of Quakers in Britain, she co-founded the Quaker Arts Network. Deepening and broadening engagement with the environmental polycrisis is a growing priority for Linda and she set up the Loving Earth (textile art) Project with this in mind. She has previously worked in government statistics and served on Quaker Life Central Committee and currently serves as a spiritual director in an ecumenical context.

Lucy Parker's mother first went to Meeting at the age of 17, and Lucy has worshipped with Friends since her teens after moving to the UK. Lucy has served in most roles in her local and area meetings, as well as on various central committees. She has particular interest and experience in clerking, eldership, church government, and nominations. Lucy is currently Co-Clerk of Central Nominations Committee.

Mark Russ is a writer, theologian and teacher. His teaching interests include spiritual practice and music, the Bible, hope, whiteness, modern Christian theology, and the beginnings of Liberal Quakerism. In 2022 he began a PhD at the University of Nottingham researching whiteness, silence and liberal Quaker theology.

Nancy Fee is a member of Pretoria Meeting, Southern Africa Yearly Meeting. She is clerk of her local meeting, and has clerked communications and learning activities for SAYM. She is currently co-clerk of the International Planning Committee of the FWCC World Plenary Meeting, to be held in Durban in 2024. She is a public health specialist, and worked for the UN across Africa and Asia. She normally spends part of each year in London, and is an elder in Westminster Meeting.

**Nick Cullen** works for War on Want and is the Climate Justice Coalition Migrant Justice Coordinator.

Nim Njuguna is a retired Baptist minister and former Quaker prison chaplain/ restorative justice trainer. Nim is now involved in researching and writing on diversity and inclusion spirituality informed by intersectionality and unconscious bias perspectives. He offers spiritual accompaniment, supervision, mediation and facilitates refresher courses for spiritual directors with SPIDIR spiritual direction network. He approaches his practice from liberation theologies and person-centred therapeutic perspectives and is keen to explore how to move spirituality from contemplation to action. He is a past tutor on the Encounter course at the London Centre for Spirituality (where he trained 15 years ago). He is a lifetime member of Spiritual Direction Europe.

Nishma Jethwa is a facilitator who has been organising for social transformation for the last 10 years. She is originally from London with roots and community here and in India. For the past four years, she has been working within movement and community spaces to lead and support experiments and imagination practices to move us towards more liberatory futures. She is interested in building community sustaining frameworks like restorative justice, transformative justice and community accountability that seek to create conditions that cultivate real transformation in our world.

Oliver Waterhouse works as a Team Leader in the Quaker Life staff team. For the last 12 years his work has been in support of Quaker communities and currently focusses on supporting good governance locally. Away from paid work he is a treasurer and a trustee and supports the delivery of events for young Quakers.

Paul Hodgkin worked as a general practitioner for many years before starting the non-for-profit website Care Opinion that enables patients, carers, and staff to share the story of care across NHS and social care across the UK. When he retired he found himself thinking more about the twin Earth crises of climate change and loss of biodiversity and how these crises are inherent to the pursuit of capitalism and economic growth on a finite planet. Witnessing these crises in their fullness and discovering how we may respond from within a renewed Quakerism is, for him, the soul work of our times.

**Paul Parker** serves as Recording Clerk for Britain Yearly Meeting and is responsible for the centrally managed work of Quakers in Britain.

Paulette Meier is a Quaker singersongwriter, peace educator, and member of Ohio Valley Yearly Meeting and Community Friends Meeting in Cincinnati, Ohio, where her strong voice has led crowds in song at many a gathering for peace, justice and an earth restored. As Artist in Residence at Pendle Hill, USA (2004-05), her appreciation for Quaker history and spirituality deepened, leading to a practice of setting inspired quotations of 17th century Quaker leaders to chantlike song.

Peter Eccles is a lifelong Quaker and is a member of Cheadle Hulme Meeting in East Cheshire Area Meeting, Britain Yearly Meeting. He has clerked his local meeting, his monthly/area meeting and Britain Yearly Meeting. He gave the Swarthmore Lecture in 2009. He is a retired mathematician and now helps run a music studio with a Quaker musician friend.

Phil Dahl, having been brought up in a clergy home was drawn to Quakers and sought membership in 1988. Once the heavy demands of professional life reduced, Phil undertook the residential Equipping for Ministry programme from 2011-2013, where his nascent interest in Isaac Penington was properly kindled. One of the advantages of lockdown for him was the extended opportunity to explore in depth the many words Isaac wrote in his lifetime, both letters and works. It is on that experience, that he now wishes to share the insights gained with others.

Phil Laurie has self-identified as a Quaker since around 2016 and has been involved in environmental activism and non-violent civil disobedience for about six years. He came to these activities after concluding that current political participants are short-sighted, focusing only on short-term electoral cycles. He hopes that his actions are rooted in the radical Quaker tradition.

Philip Gross is committed to the principles of collaboration and disciplined playfulness in freeing the life of our words. He has worked with visual artists, dancers and musicians as well as fellow poets, and his own prize-winning poetry has been praised for its powers of close observation and his thoughtful, questioning, exploratory approach to the writing itself.

Rachel Krishnaswami is passionate about diversity and inclusion in Quaker communities. In 2023 she studied modern Quaker families with the help of a research scholarship from Cambridgeshire Area Meeting. She helped organise the first Faithfulness Group in Britain and is helping to spread the word about this method of peer-led spiritual accompaniment.

Robin Bowles has played music all his life in a wide variety of settings and has a particular passion for playing music for improvised dance. Robin spent many years as a community musician and workshop facilitator specialising in working with dance and movement. He currently

teaches piano and plays a variety of tuned and percussive instruments. He has played in a wide variety of bands much of his life embracing many genres of music from classical, rock, pop and soul through to jazz, Celtic and eastern European folk and free improvisation.

Rosemary Field has been a Quaker all her adult life. She greatly valued the experience of Equipping for Ministry 2015-17 and in 2021 the opportunity provided by an Eva Koch scholarship to explore the value of Centering Prayer for Friends. She believes the loss of her husband prompted her to go more deeply into her Quaker faith and is keen to explore with Friends what loss, ageing and facing death may bring.

Rosie Carnall is a Quaker and an experienced facilitator. Her practice centres on philosophical enquiry and creative writing. She loves to get people of all ages thinking, talking and creating together – in pubs, art galleries, community venues or online. Rosie has an MA in Creative Writing and a professional background in mediation. She is a former Eva Koch scholar and serves on the Book of Discipline Revision Committee.

**Ruth Wilde** is a part-time Pastor in a URC/ Methodist Church in Redditch and parttime Tutor for the Inclusion of Disabled People at Northern Baptist College. She was previously the National Coordinator of the charity Inclusive Church and has also worked for other Christian charities, including Community Peacemaker Teams and Student Christian Movement. Ruth has an MA in Christian Contemporary Theology from Newman University and her theological interests are in contextual theology/liberation theologies and inclusive evangelism.

Sadie DeCoste is a climate change researcher and activist with a focus on climate reparations, transformative adaptation, and loss and damage. At Tipping Point, she supports the Climate Reparations Network and the Care & Repair team. She co-founded the Loss and Damage Youth Coalition and has been active in loss and damage movements for several years. She loves gardening and musical theatre.

Sam Donaldson hosts courageous conversations, brave learning spaces and slow, sacred retreats, helping people and organisations to make sense of and live well within this time of multiple system failure, the sixth mass extinction. He has completed a PGC in Psychosynthesis Leadership Coaching and is a practicing Zen Buddhist and Quaker. He has a first-class BA in Philosophy, Politics and Economics from Oxford University, and an MA in Post-war Recovery Studies from York University. He writes, organises for peace and eco-justice, and loves to read, listen to music, play tennis, watch rugby and walk in nature

Sarah Diedro Jordão is a DEIB Consultant and trainer, communications strategist, podcast host and versatile consultant. The driving interests foundational to her work are social justice, intersectional feminism, collective dreaming and Black joy. Among many exciting projects, she served as an Intersectionality expert for the North-South Center of the Council of Europe, a moderator for the World Forum for Democracy and a podcast host for the European Greens.

Sarah Donaldson is a member of Manchester & Warrington Area Meeting. She has extensive experience as a Quaker clerk and as a Quaker trustee and has taught Woodbrooke courses on both of these topics. Sarah is currently serving on the group set up to review various aspects of governance within our Yearly Meeting structures.

Shanon Shah is the Director of Faith for the Climate. He balanced careers in human rights advocacy, journalism, and theatre and music in his native Malaysia before relocating to London in 2010. He holds a doctorate in the sociology of religion from King's College London and conducts research for the Information Network Focus on Religious Movements (Inform), an independent educational charity based at King's College London. He is also Tutor in Islam at the University of London's Divinity programme.
